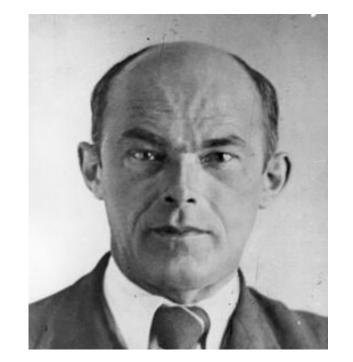

13. THE BATHS

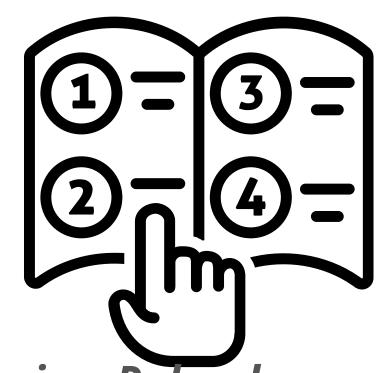
You are standing in front of a big building with huge windows.
